## MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD AND THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

As an organization providing urgent and emergent services and programs for vulnerable populations, Adsum rarely experiences typical times. But in what we would consider a 'typical' year-end report, we'd naturally and easily reflect on the organization's activities and milestones over the course of the previous 12 months. Quite honestly, it is challenging for us to recollect what our work entailed prior to the last few weeks of the 2019-2020 fiscal year.

While the COVID-19 pandemic hit just as our fiscal year was winding down, the challenges it presented to Adsum cannot be minimized. Seemingly overnight, we were forced to dust off our Pandemic Plan and set straight to work implementing and adapting our planned measures to meet rapidly changing guidelines and restrictions from public health while ensuring the health and safety of our clients, staff, volunteers and greater community. Knowing that a response of this scale would require resources that were not budgeted for, Adsum launched an informal fundraising campaign through our website, social media and through direct emails to supporters and friends. Our existing donors, and many donors new to us, generously responded. In the pandemic's early days, Adsum also supported other shelter organizations and government in the setting up of emergency pop-up shelters to allow for safe physical distancing in our city's crowded shelters. Our staff have worked tirelessly and creatively throughout this time to develop new ways to provide the support our clients need. This is no easy feat to accomplish during a global pandemic whilst working in aged facilities with limited resources. Deep gratitude is owed to every person on the Adsum team who is working through an extraordinary time, all the while having to manage their own risk of exposure to the deadly virus.

Prior to the arrival of COVID-19, fiscal 2019-20 was a year of many milestones. Early in the year, the Investment Property Owners Association of Nova Scotia honoured our executive director as a 'Pillar of the Community'; our special events were a hit, including our sold-out Successful Canadian Women Dinner which featured a capella quartet, Four the Moment; Adsum was proud to be named the Gold Winner in the annual Coast Award's 'Activist Organization' category; we wished our finance manager of 19 years, Nancy Lamrock, a happy and well-deserved retirement; and we proudly witnessed members of our provincial legislature highlight Adsum's work on the floor of the Legislative Assembly.

In addition to these special moments, we made great strides in our work to convince government to invest in programs like our 'Diverting Families from Shelter to Home.' The outcomes of this program and the impact it has on insecurely housed families have been remarkable – to date, we have assisted almost 100 families with more than 150 children. We're pleased that the provincial government has committed \$400,000 per year for the next five years to help meet its costs. We know all too well that this investment, while significant, scratches the surface of the operational needs of the organization. We will continue to work to raise the funds required to expand our activities and programs and will continue to advocate before governments of all levels that homelessness is not sustainable.

What we have witnessed in the short months since the declaration of the global pandemic is an extraordinary outpouring of funds and resources for businesses, organizations, individuals and students. We have seen an unbelievable display of creativity in solving some very complicated issues associated with public health restrictions. Many of us have adapted and found ways to thrive, in spite of the pandemic. And yet, not enough has changed; there are still hundreds of people in our own community without a safe place to call home. We must challenge ourselves, others and ultimately, government to put the resources in place to ensure that our province's most marginalized, judged and often invisible citizens have their most basic human rights met through the provision of safe, stable housing.

We all want to be on the right side of history. Providing homes for everyone is a basic first step.




























































## **CHRISTMAS AT ADSUM**



With the expanded offsite space, we were able to have individual donors and companies more easily deliver donations while volunteer teams helped with the sorting, choosing, and wrapping for clients. The parents of 286 children we know at Adsum or through sister organizations in our community were invited to visit and 'shop' for free for new toys, clothes, books and stocking stuffers. We believe that this is a better reflection of our values by offering more choice, dignity and self-esteem to parents.

At the shelter, we hosted our annual wrapping day and prepared large gift bags for 120 women, youth and trans people for Christmas. With the remaining toys and a huge toy drive organized by FX 101.9 and generously supported by the community, we hosted our nowannual Christmas Eve toy giveaway. Bags for 298 children went out the door in time for Christmas through this event. Special thanks to Lisa at Freeman's Little New York who kept our volunteers and folks waiting in line supplied with hot pizza.

We could not do any of this without the generous support and giving spirit of the Halifax community. Thank you to everyone - families, community groups and companies - for being part of our efforts at Christmas.







## OUTREACH HOUSING SUPPORT

When things get bad, Jenna always has a place to go—her mother's, her co-worker's, a friend's house. She carefully plans her stays to ensure that she and her children are always safe and housed. Staying two weeks here and there, dividing her children amongst friends and family — the stays are brief as Jenna does not want to over-stay her welcome. Her belongings are organized in plastic bins in the trunk of her car, one for each of her children, with their favorite toys and clothes.

At Adsum we have heard countless stories of the 'invisible homelessness' caused by gendered violence and poverty. We have seen how challenging it can be for women, trans-people and children to obtain and maintain affordable, safe, and stable housing. Homelessness is largely underpinned by structural factors, including inadequate income, systemic discrimination, lack of affordable housing and family violence. While poverty rates in the rest of the country have declined, Nova Scotia's rate has continued to increase. Nova Scotia currently has the dubious distinction of being the province with the highest rate of child poverty in the country, at 17%. Jenna's scenario above could describe the life of one of hundreds of children who are homeless across Nova Scotia right now.

Our housing team of five seeks to address the immediate need for safe emergency housing and longer-term secure housing. We provide a variety of interventions ranging from safety planning, eviction prevention, diversion, rapid re-housing services and ongoing outreach support to individuals and families to maintain housing and improve overall social and emotional well-being.

During the 2019/20 fiscal year the Adsum Housing Team supported a total of 468 individuals, including 149 children. In addition to our regular caseloads, our team provides one time supports such as: meeting and/or consulting with outside organizations about a client's needs, offering housing resources and advice, attending apartment viewings as a support person, or referring someone to an outside organization.

The clients we support face complex layers of structural and systemic barriers on a daily basis. These barriers are increasingly difficult to navigate as the gap continues to widen between insufficient shelter and personal allowances from Income Assistance (now called the Standard Household Rate) and increasing rents and costs of living. A single person who is entitled to disability allowance receives the grossly inadequate payment of \$880/month. A single mother with

two or more children receives a mere \$913/month. This amount must cover housing costs (rent and utilities) plus all of their personal needs: medications, personal hygiene products, menstrual supplies, clothing, phone bill, banking fees, laundry, entertainment and whatever portion of the rent is not covered by the shelter allowance. These amounts are in no way reflective of the reality of the rental market in HRM where a one-bedroom apartment costs an average of \$1000 per month while a three-bedroom costs a minimum of \$1400. Coupled with the staggeringly low 1% vacancy rate in Halifax – finding suitable housing is a monumental and daunting task.

Our team is extremely privileged to be able to do this work. We value and appreciate the trust that is extended to us by the folks we serve. We believe that by the sharing of skills, knowledge, and support of others doing this and similar work, both within Adsum and from the wider community, the people we support will benefit greatly. We continue to be innovative in our attempts to constantly drive our practice in response to the voices and needs of the folks we serve. We look forward to a day when our focus is no longer on harm-reduction and that everyone is safely and securely housed, no one is hungry and the basic needs of every one of us are met.

## A JOURNEY FROM **ROAD TO HEAVEN**

I came to Canada as a single mom with my girls ages 8, 5 and 1. I was totally alone without any family member or relative in Canada and I was homeless with 3 children.


Once I arrived in Canada, I stayed for few days at my friend's home and I realized that I should move somewhere because it is difficult to stay at someone's home along with three kids. I contacted income assistance but unfortunately, Christmas holidays were very close, and they dragged my application until after the holidays. It was such an unfortunate time for me and my family. Suddenly, my friend mentioned Adsum Housing Support, and I promptly reached out to them. I felt somebody was there to heal my wound. My brain was a little relaxed when my case worker; Meghan told me "I am here for you; you don't need to worry about anything. Just relax." I was crying like a baby because I had only \$5 in my pocket. They promptly stood by me like a pillar of a building. They

arranged a motel for our family and everything we needed. I could

breathe with Adsum's amazing assistance in such a bad situation.

Adsum's team assisted me in finding an apartment and helped me furnish it. Once we entered our new home my kids and I felt like we got into heaven. That was an awesome experience in our life. Afterwards Adsum started assisting in getting us groceries, helping with a food box from the food bank, gift cards, clothes, and many more necessities of everyday life. If an item that I needed was not available at Adsum House, they bought a brand new one for me, which was more than appreciated.

It's been more than one year, and my Adsum Case Worker is always there for me whenever I need her. She is such a lovely lady and friendly person. She meets more than my expectations. As a single mom, Covid-19 is very hard for me to get out from home to buy groceries. I cannot take my kids with me nor could I leave them all alone at home. Thank God Adsum workers are beside me at this challenging time.







I have a master's degree from a Canadian university, but I am unable to work right now as I am the only person to take care of three minors. Being a welleducated person, I have dreams about my bright future. I would like to have a beautiful job which can transform our life. That can only be done once my husband will be in Canada. I am hoping to fulfill my dreams and I will always remember the assistance from Adsum.

I hope and wish they will continue to help me and others who are really in need as I pass through this situation and get rewarded from Lord!









## COVID-19

We are living through a strange and challenging year where much of what we do is being defined by pandemic COVID-19. Even before the first case was reported in Nova Scotia, we had started to gather products that we would need at Adsum to help protect residents, tenants, staff and volunteers, as well as our shelter and housing locations. While we had crisis plans and procedures in place, we have never faced an emergency of this scale. We consulted extensively with other shelters and community partners and government to discuss how we might be impacted. We had to move quickly, and act creatively. Here's why.

Many people we meet at Adsum live with chronic medical conditions and are at high risk for developing severe illness if infected with COVID-19. They experience barriers when trying to access traditional health services and community resources. They lack the means and the space, when homeless, to follow the best public health advice and health promotion messages - to isolate, to practice physical distancing and to wash their hands. Housed precariously, they are often of low income and lack resources to purchase cleaning products in high demand and other basics, or internet service.

Our job at Adsum, therefore, was to take precautionary measures and resolve concerns as they arose. One of our first moves was to add staff to ensure that everyone properly and frequently washed and sanitized their hands and surfaces. At the same time, we asked some colleagues to work from home. We closed the shelter kitchen to residents and began preparing individually plated meals. We invested in new equipment such as motion-detected paper towel dispensers, and stretched our budget lines to adapt to new, more stringent, standards. We closed all Adsum locations to volunteers and visitors. This was a huge and unexpected loss, as we have traditionally relied on many dedicated people to help at Adsum. We look forward to a reunion with our volunteers when it is safe to welcome them back.

As we continue to learn more about this novel virus, we can say two things with certainty. The coming year will be very tough, particularly for people with limited resources who have precarious or no housing. Secondly, we will have to go above and beyond at Adsum to serve as many people as safely possible while managing risk. We will try to live up to our name. Ad Sum. I Am Here.



We are deeply grateful to staff and folks who use our services for doing their part to keep us all safe, and for supporters who contributed resources we needed.



These monies are used to advance the vision of the Association that everyone has a safe and secure home; which would not be possible without the generosity of Adsum supporters.





"When I started, there was the shelter on Brunswick and 16 apartments in Dartmouth. It has been amazing to see and be a part of the growth every year, to support and house hundreds more people. What a statement Adsum has made in the community

and beyond. Working at Adsum has been a privilege and has made me a better person in so many ways. Working with Sheri for most of those years, has taught me to be stronger and fight harder for the underdog which I am proud to say I continue to do. It was a job that took a lot but gave more in return. I have made lifelong friends with staff and clients and I'm proud to say I was a member of the incredible family that was and continues to be Adsum for Women & Children."
